

Teachers come with their classes for a hands on, immersive experience that connects their learning at school to their discoveries at Glenbow. Working with the Museum School Coordinators, each teacher plans a week for their students that is unique to each class's needs and interests.

Year in Review

2017-2018 was our twenty-third year of operation as Glenbow Museum School and our twenty-second year partnering with Chevron Canada. We welcomed 690 students, 28 teachers and close to 300 adult helpers and parent volunteers into our classroom. Students chatted with artists, interviewed curators and wrote with authors. They got to know our Blackfoot educators through stories and language and sang and hoop danced their way into broader cultural understandings.

25th Anniversary Celebration

2018 was the 25th year that Chevron Open Minds sites have been offering site based, inquiry learning in Calgary. This milestone was recognized with a celebration breakfast in June at the first site, the Calgary Zoo.

Staff Development

Highlights of this year were bookended with two learning conferences. In September we attended "Ignite", the Alberta and Western Museum Association's annual conference in Edmonton. Themes within the conference that were of great interest to us were how can museums be agents of social change and how can we make museums more inclusive places. We ended the year with the Beyond the Classroom Conference, a coming together of Open Minds sites from across the country. We presented a workshop on cultural safety and how to start creating a culturally save space within our classrooms and our sites. Marnie also attended the "Learning and the Brain" conference in San Francisco where the top brain researchers and educators from Berkley, Stanford and Harvard Universities gathered to share research about creativity and the brain with 1500 educators.





Survey Results: Teacher My ability to identify and create relevant and authentic connections among disciplines has increased and deepened.



Survey Results: Teacher Personalizing learning comes from an awareness of students' strengths and needs. My ability to personalize learning has grown.




"This opportunity allows me to find a way to excite and include all learners."

Survey Results: Teacher Because of my involvement in Open Minds, I am more likely to practice inquiry-based learning/teaching on a regular basis going forward.




Survey Results: Teacher

I listen to student voice through journals, conversation and experiences and respond with flexibility as we co-design learning tasks.





Survey Results: Teacher The orientation, summer in-service, planning meetings and CC/OM workshops throughout the year have met my needs.










My students are likely to apply the knowledge and skills acquired across all academic disciplines.



Survey Results: Students My students have gained confidence as learners.


"I liked this field trip because I got smarter. If I were there for long enough, I would sketch ALL the artifacts." Gr. 4 student







Survey Results: Students My students have a clearer understanding of the role museums play in society.


