
About the Participants

Background

- The Area 6 and 7 impacted schools online survey was available to parents and others from Dec. 20, 2017 to Jan. 15, 2018. The thoughts and perspectives provided through this survey will be considered in developing options to be presented for feedback at in-person sessions in early February 2018.
- The survey received over 600 completed responses.
- Results for Group B schools have been weighted to account for the significant over-representation of one school and significant under-representation of one school. Group A results have not been weighted as responses are reasonably proportionate to populations.
- This report includes survey results and comments.


Respondent Profile



NOTE: Rosscarrock and West Springs schools are somewhat over-represented in the survey, and West Ridge and Wildwood schools are somewhat under-represented.






Group A - Opportunities


When considering the possibility of K-4 students from the community of Cougar Ridge attending school closer to home, what challenges do you see?



represented. Richmond and Glendale schools are also somewhat under-represented.






Group B - Opportunities

When considering the possibility of clearly defined boundaries for the four schools, what benefits do you see? Answered: 183




Group B - Challenges

- Kids going to multiple schools in short periods of time. Ex: my child will have to change 3 schools in three years!

- Way more traffic because kids from Cougar Ridge will not walk to WSS. So more car traffic and more buses. Also overcrowding in the school.
- Schools losing important personnel and resources because of lack of funding available, stretching everyone thin.

- Worry about before / after school care, but that's a self-serving interest.
- Living in a walk zone that is just at the 1.8 km mark. A far distance on cold days and scary with the reported "stranger sightings" and attempt in the West Springs area. I do not like my child having to walk such a far distance



and it is difficult to drive to and from school and work a full-time job, especially with other children in different schools.

Q8 (Group A): Do you have any other comments or questions you would like to share?

- Students should have access to quality education closer to their home but not at the expense of other schools being shut down due to low student count. This additional cost should be looked upon as an investment and not as a cost for keeping the school open and running.
- Our child goes to Dr. Roberta Bondar as we wanted to stay on the hill. It's important for us to keep our kids in our community.
- It is time that Cougar Ridge students get to go to school closer and be treated fairly not always be the afterthought! They have been pushed around for too long!
- On transition you must consider different paths for schools with multiple children in attendance, students that have attended for multiple years vs new students and have a long term vision based on growth statistics. It would be hugely disruptive if not consistent movement and based off lottery for transition.
- I find it ridiculous that my child cannot attend the new school in west springs when that school was built as a cougar ridge - west springs school. The ability for interest groups to politically pressure the CBE is unbelievable and

creates a have and have nor system. Everyone contributes to the school system equitably and should be provided schooling at the closest school to their home.

- I think that the students from Cougar Ridge should have the opportunity to attend an elementary school close to their home. However the students of Wildwood should have this same opportunity and in addition the families of Wildwood have moved there in many cases to allow their children the opportunity to go to already existing Wildwood School (as opposed to one that is to be built as in Cougar Ridge). Many of the Wildwood families have chosen to live in this community because of the inner city commute and the surrounding nature. We pay a premium to live in a community like Wildwood because it speaks to our values and the way we want to raise our families. It seems unfair that we should have to be concerned about losing such an amazing school that already exists! It would be truly sad if people were deterred from moving to such an amazing established community because they were unsure of the local school's future. With all of the talk and moves toward urban densification it makes no sense to be considering altering a school that is already working. Families will continue to move to Wildwood because of it's amazing attributes, including it's school. Respectfully I would hope that the CBE would be considering these plans for urban community densification as a grounds to keep already existing schools available for future population trends.
- It would be very disruptive to students currently at Wildwood to have to change schools if that is not their preference.
- Allowing children in Cougar Ridge to attend school closer to home is a decision that is way overdue.
- My child has an incredible in-class aide who I would want to stay in his class.
 As a shared resource, if some students left I would not want that to effect her availability with my child.
- Rosscarrock school is far away from Cougar Ridge and it does not make any sense to be the designated school for this area.
- It's a shame that the community of Cougar Ridge was developed without a public community school. This area caters to young families and I feel bad that their kids are having to be bussed away from the community for school. This area does not have the schools in place to accommodate all of these students and I would not be surprised if catchment lines would be redrawn; thus creating new boundaries and forcing other neighbourhood children to attend other schools.
- It would be nice to see Cougar Ridge students attending a school closer to home, however, I see overcrowding challenges. If overcrowding is an issue, I don't think it is favourable for any student or teacher. There are also new housing developments going up to consider.



- Our two children are students in West Ridge School. Our third child is to be forced from Wildwood to Rosscarock. Should the 3rd not be next door to the other 2?
- Thank you for asking for our feedback!
- It's important for siblings to attend the same school, a lottery system should not be applied for siblings
- what happens when there are more kids from Cougar Ridge now allowed into West Springs school than there is room? What happens when the new development along OBCR and 85th opens and there are even more kids wanting into the schools? We don't want to allow the CR kids in, and then tell them a few years from now that they are no longer allowed in.
- as a parents of child living in Cougar Ridge we find it unacceptable a young child would have to be bussed out of the cimmunity to go to school therefore we ade investing in our child going to a private school
- It is in family's best interests to be allowed to attend schools that are closest to them so as to provide a service that has the least amount of impact on their lives
- The lottery process at West Springs caused what I saw to be great divisiveness among what was to be a 'community'. If all kids for a given area can fit then great, if not find another option.
- Ultimately, I agree with the proposal. But I do fear that families will be forced to accept a certain decision that won't work for their individual needs. I'm hoping a transition period to help those families, rather than a frim line in the sand.
- I agree with moving them into the community schools if there is room. Solid population studies need to be done to ensure sufficient space for them. With all the new schools opening, the current numbers are not an accurate reflection of what numbers will be 2 years from now. Cannot risk HIGH overpopulation in current schools, only to make changes again in a few years.
- The bussing changes this year have been absolutely terrible. The system needs a complete overhaul. The last few years have had their share of problems but this year - route changes, distance to stops, walking distance from schools so NO Busses, etc. Disaster.
- Please provide continuity for the kids that are already at Wildwood. They
 need to stay in their existing school. They need to continue to be bused to
 the school where they are succeeding and thriving. Please let them finish
 what and where they started
- Development of new communities should take into consideration of school availability in the area.
- It is very important to me that my children attending Wildwood can continue to attend until grade 5 when they move to West Ridge
- Most importantly for safety of the children it is vital for them to be in a school that is close to home to minimize their additional time on the road being at

high risk of accidents and making longer than necessary days. There is too much confusion on which bus top to get off at and I have too many stories hearing children having this problem and ending up far away from home. Unacceptable. Schools must be offered in the communities where children can access the necessary resources they are entitled to.

- I am concerned that by allowing children from Cougar Ridge would change our walk zone and my child would then be forced to Dr Roberta Bondar. This would have a significant impact in the relationships and community we have built over 2 year. I am not against Children from Cougar Ridge from attending West Springs School, I would be very disappointed to accommodate this existing West Springs Students could be moved and impacted.
- We moved to West Springs so our children could attend West Springs School and West Ridge School. We do not want to compete with Cougar Ridge in a lottery.
- We purchased a home in Cougar Ridge with the expectation that our children would attend their assigned school which was Olymipc Heights at the time. When our children were ready to go to school Olympic Heights was capped and caused our children to go to a further school outside of our community. Had we know this at the time of buying our house it may have changed our decision to live in this community. The designation of schools for a community need to be more accurate so parents can take all factors into account when they decide where to live.
- With the new school opening up in the west, there should be no reason why cougar ridge and surrounding committees cannot attend school in there communities. CoougarRidge seems like one of the only communites that was removed from being able to attend school in the area. I believe back in 2006-2007 the community of cougarridge was suppose to be getting a school and then it never happened. School was build it west springs and cougarridge kids were removed from the option of attending.
- Biggest concern would be that students within the current walk zone not be negatively impacted (ie. be guaranteed space in the existing school)
- The residents of cougar ridge were promised from the beginning of the development a public school in the neighborhood was to be built that our students could attend. One was then we were displaced. Unfair
- Overcrowding at West Springs School
- I have concerns with over crowding as was the case when West Springs school was K-6. I do side with Cougar Ridge parents wanting to be closer to their school but fear the idea that my child may be bumped out of the walk zone to make room for Cougar Ridge families. I also fear what will happen when the familes of the MANY Truman high density complexes are built, where will all these children go to school?



- 1) Why at this time when city planning for 10 years have been done earlier.2) Who has wasted interest in certain outcome.
- I don't know why Rosscarrock School is designated for Cougar Ridge. It should have been West Spring School.
- Still seems absurd to me that the city would allow two private schools in a community without a public school anywhere near it.
- The ability for Cougar Ridge to attend depends on long term planning. How will this look in 1, 3 and 5 years not just the current year or two. It divides communities and neighbours when you have competing needs/interests depending on how old your child is. West Springs has after/before school which is amazing to have in our community. think about other uses for the space.
- It is great if they could attend West Spring but bussing for all of Cougar Ridge needs to be provided, it is too far to walk even for the older kids and with no lights by the Max and Petro-Canada station it is very dangerous.
- It doesn't make sense for a middle school to allow for Cougar Ridge children and not the elementary. Very poor planning overall and very unfair to parents to have two children in two separate schools so far away from eachother. But it is equally unfair for West Springs elementary to suddenly burst at the seams again and then go back to a lottery system. Are we going to go back to having children in a library as their classroom? Does this stand by the mission statement of the CBE which is to put children first? I'm not sure.
- This survey in no way provides any type of concrete plan on which to comment. It is vague, and does not provide enough information on which to make comment about affected schools, total student impact, or potential issues.
- Why can't you plan more efficiently and effectively? Something very wrong with how schools are placed.

- It would be nice for Cougar Ridge to attend closer to home, but not at the expense of kids already attending West Springs (than moving West Ridge).
- The over capacity issues of space are short term and can be successfully managed. I think opening up space for only some Cougar Ridge residents is problematic (lottery) and divides community. Would like to see accommodation of all in some way, even if it means considering changing configuration for a short period of time.
- what does "Keep cohort groups of students together" mean?
- It is tough to drive kids 20 minutes down now trail in winter to go to kindergarten or any other class. Most kids get to walk to school or bus less than 5 or 10 minuets



- I would have to see the numbers projected for cougar ridge compared to the space available at west springs. I don't want bigger class sizes and I want to maintain a music room and library.
- I very much agree with providing all students with the best opportunity possible for them to attend a school close to home. However, I admit that I have NO idea what "changes that allow K-4 students from the Cougar Ridge community to attend school closer to home" actually looks like. What school(s) would they be removed from, and moved to? Which schools would be gaining students and which loosing students? I don't know the background, and would have appreciated getting some as part of this survey so I could be more informed.
- For question 5 as a west springs parent, it's hard to agree without visibility into the long term projections (of students). As far as I know we were already at capacity, hence making West Ridge 5-9.
- Are there considerations for grade 4+
- The Province and CBE should be ashamed of themselves for allowing homes to be built without a school for kids to attend. Make the builders who profit in new communities build the school and then the homes.
- It makes more sense for students from the Cougar Ridge community to attend West Springs school as they live & play sports in the same community.
- If there is room. But I do have to say that overcrowded schools are far from ideal and lotteries cause parents alot of stress!
- Rosscarrock and Wildwood are not desired schools for Cougar Ridge students.
- All students should have the right to attend their community school. This
 enhances the school experience for students and schools need to be an
 active part of the community it is in. Students being bussed in would not be
 part
- My youngest is currently at a private school in Grade 4. I wanted to be in a school in our community. I have paid privately for many years for this privledge. I was very disappointed when I learned there was not a close public school in our community.
- I see this as a move to help parents and not for the students. The CR kids will still need to bus, WSS will then face space problems and the Rosscarrock kids will loose out in the extra funding and programs that they can have by having a larger school and then potentially they will be bussing if their school closes or can not run on their small populations.
- I would really like to have the option for my child to attend a school closer to home.
- Why do Cougar Ridge families have to bus their kids so far in the first place, when all communities adjacent have several close options to choose from,



- eg, Aspen having Olympic Heights and Bondar. The most frustrating issue now that West Ridge is designated, is that K-4 remains Rosscarrock.
- If there will be uncertainty for space from year to year, and a lottery of some sort will be part of the process, I think it is not worth pursuing. I think it is dissappointing that Cougar Ridge students have been shifted around 2 times already, and would be very frustrated to see a temporary change to closer to home, only to have it change again to a further school.
- I feel VERY strongly that families in Cougar Ridge should be able to attend West Springs. My kids can literally WALK there but instead need to be bused very far away, to a community we have no ties with. Where was city planning and CBE planning when Cougar Ridge community was being built? Where was CBE and city planning when they were building Westsprings school? HOW could this have happened. We need to build onto Westsprings. CBE and the City of Calgary and AB Education need to be flexible and make CHANGE!

- I believe children from K-4 should attend a school as close to home as possible
- I personally feel that Rosscarrock is too far for a kindergarten student to go, especially with cold weather and traffic. Cougar Ridge has been waiting for an school for a long time and we keep getting knocked further down the list. I have accepted that there will not be an elementary school but I think it's important that CBE accommodates our community as well. The pressure has been relieved from all the other communities on the hill and Cougar Ridge is still in the same position. I'm hopeful that in the next year there will be changes to our designated school and my child will be able to go to a school closer to home.
- It would be nice to have a couple years of reprieve of this issue. It causes a lot of anxiety in parents when things keep changing.
- I've seen many families move out of the neighborhood for this reason alone. This means my child's friends continue to move away. Some stability for school would transfer to stable relationships being built in the community as well.
- This is so long overdue it's ridiculous. It's crazy that the furthest community up the hill is the one travelling to go to schools down the hill. The CBE should have redrawn the boundaries a long time ago. It's crazy that the CBE is sticking to community boundaries as defined by the city rather than using common sense.
- This survey should've been done before, to minimize the impact of moving schools on kids. The current school assignment makes no sense at all. I have kids attending Westridge and Rosscarrock.

- What's really needed and should have always been part of planning is a public school(s) for Cougar Ridge. It is unfair for CBE to create possible over crowding, and/or a return to a lottery system to accommodate Cougar Ridge students at West Springs. The lottery and overcrowding issue has finally resolved itself in the last few years and we have a sustainable school with appropriate #s in West Springs. Completely unfair for this to be ruined simply because the proper planning wasn't done by City, CBE and Cougar Ridge developers to build public schools in Cougar Ridge!!!
- Bussing kids away from the community puts strain on CBE resources
- There wasn't supposed to be an elementary school built in CR. Why overcrowd West Springs school for those families who purposely bought in that community for access to that particular school?
- I would love to have my Cougar Ridge child attend West Springs, but would hate to see a lottery arise becuase of it, or have issues down the road and possibly having CR kids not allowed to attend.
- Adding additional students from Cougar Ridge to West Springs School, we feel, will negatively impact the school in many ways. If class sizes increase, the overall learning experience will decline especially if the music room, library, learning commons and staff room will be moved to accommodate more classrooms. West Springs School, currently, already feels very crowded. We disagree with opening the boundaries for West Springs School to allow students from Cougar Ridge. We are concerned that West Springs school is already full and that current students would be negatively impacted if more students are added. Thank you.

This makes it difficult for him to be motivated to play outside and be active on weekends and evenings as well as during the summer. If he went to school nearby he would get to know kids closer to home and be much more comfortable
- Do not overcrowd schools. Build infrastructure. The risk of too many kids in schools and the risk of high school kids (new drivers) having to drive far because there is no room is unacceptable.
- What did the city think was going to happen when they allow this extent of development in the young family demographic. The city and developers need to be held accountable for providing infrastructure in a timely manner to support all these residences, to just how much money they will make. All these families pay taxes. Not enough schools but 2 Tim Hortons!
- I strongly disagree with having those students attend West Springs or West Ridge Schools



- Cougar Ridge has not public or catholic school with a walking distance. It seems like West Spring has more privilege than us with Catholic and Public options.
- It is a difficult decision. There are a lot of children in Cougar Ridge in different programs that might've choose to make the move if it becomes available. I am concerned about overcrowding and the fact that the decision could be reversed in a couple of years which would cause even more disruption. It needs to be a sustainable move that will last longer than a couple of years. There will be more animosity if it goes ahead for 5 years and then gets reversed
- The West Springs and West Ridge School are overpopulated and any further changes will interfere with education and learning.
- Question 5 is difficult to understand: "Agree with the possibility of changes?" What does that mean?
- We specifically moved from Cougar Ridge to West Springs in order to send our kids to a community school. Be clear on the intentions related to eligibility criteria (walk zone/ bus zone) as early abs possible. Eliminate uncertainty for parents and be consistent with the use of the lottery process. Eliminatinting uncertainty for parents as soon as you are able will maintain the goodwill of the community. The last recess was less than ideal.
- The coming West District build is going to greatly increase these issues and yet the Province indicated to the developers that there was no need for additional schools. Development of schools should be a requirement of community builds. This happens in other provinces and I cannot understand why it is not the case here.
- I believe there should be provision for families who desire to remain at their current school. Recognizing transportation is a challenge - combine the bussing for Rosscarrock and Wildwood to accomodatw these families.
- We have been waiting for this for years!
- Cougar Ridge has received the short end of the stick when it comes to education. We moved from Cougar Ridge to West Springs to attend a closer community school but we know not all families have the choice to relocate.
- French Immersion should not be considered an alternative program. As it costs more, as it is far away, rather than a possibility in a greater number of schools, there is a deterrent to families selecting the french (One of Canada's Official Languages) immersion program.
- Cougar Ridge was supposed to have their own school- what ever happened to that? It was promised before Aspen even existed.
- Have you considered ensuring those living in the current walk zone to have definitive placement hoping to allow room for Cougar Ridge students but if a lottery ensued it would be a lottery for those living the farthest away (ie cougar ridge students)

- Stop dividing our communities. Stop making our kids travel so far on the bus. Stop the uncertainty between siblings over the years as we cannot predict nor plan for schools when they change so much.
- It's ridiculous that there are 2 schools a 10 minute walk away that our Cougar Ridge kids cannot attend.
- Very disappointed about the change of wildwood to Rosscarrock as designated elementary
- My concern is increased student to teacher ratio. Overcrowding; putting strain on West Springs School
- It is imperative to have my child connect with other students on a social level with kids IN his community. Bussing can take over 1 hour one way. Please strongly consider CR students in Westsprings.
- It would be great for Cougar Ridge to have this opportunity for our families
- Paskapoo kids fall between the gaps with schools. All the kids on our little culdesac are at different schools... not ok! Our kids belong in their local school with their local community.
- Overcrowding is a huge concern. The CBE is using incorrect numbers for WSS and we risk losing music and library rooms and too big classes. Again. Not okay.
- Having kids closer to home is a great idea.
- This would be a wonderful opportunity for our children. To be able to walk to school. Have school friends in our neighbourhood. Decrease transportation cost. Increased quality of life.
- Expand the school if necessary to accommodate kids going to school in their communities.
- If there is no option for our child to attend school closer to home, we will be forced to move out of a community and home we love.
- Leaving decisions late in school year make it hard for parents to secure before and after care for their children
- With no CR school in the future, must find a place for CR K-4 closer to home.
 Kids will be together in West Ridge grade 5, would be good to get groups together sooner and reduce busing across Sarcee
- Kids go 2 NW sch. New Cougar Ridge families not allowed 2 go 2 Wildwood 6 yrs ago. West Springs Sch. opened, we're not allowed b/c on wrong side of Old Banff Coach. West Spr's Sch. - lottery sys.
- There is no consideration for before & after care for younger students in West Ridge. Grade 5 and 6 students are too young to go home alone, but there are no regulated options for these students.
- I live in cougar Ridge. My child attends westridge. Right now, my other child is attending wildwood. It just doesn't make sense to send them further school by paying school bus fee.



- Sadly, my kids won't benefit from this long needed change but I feel strongly it needs to happen.
- Students who currently attend Wildwood and are living in Cougar Ridge should be allowed to finish out all the grades available to them at Wildwood. Disruption too hard on the kids and the families.

- Not all schools have enough before/after care openings
- Longer travel times for both parents and students in opposite direction from commute (I.e. far less family time at home, less homework time, more stressful meal times, rushed mornings)
- Biggest challenge is this survey not providing enough context to undestand the issue.
- Continuity of education for siblings
- Too rigid of criteria in attending schools of choice.
- Over sized classrooms and split grades in one class
- Forced to attend low ranked school
- Less diversity and student population in the school
- Not being able to place a child in an environment that best serves her or his individual strengths, challenges and personality.



- I don't intend to disrupt my child from his current school so if that is a risk, it would be a substantial challenge.

Q14 (Group B): Do you have any other comments or questions you would like to share? - 54 responses

- While I don't like the thought of taking away choice of school from families I am extremely concerned about school closure due to under capacity. I am very happy with the school we are at and would hate to see it closed due to under capacity. I would like all the schools to have long term sustainability. Having a clearly defined boundary may also enhance the community in some ways. There is something sad in some ways to be said about living on a street where it seems like none of the kids go to the same school anymore and yet they live in the same general community.
- I would rather have my child go to our designated school but I could not get a before/after care spot for that school.
- 1. There are other ways to solve this problem rather than bureaucratic boundary changes. Program and/or facility improvement at a school alone may make a difference in demand for a school. For example, we love Alex Ferguson, but it lacks virtually any extracurricular activities. If a school were to adopt a more progressive, dynamic environment for clubs or sports, demand will go up. I encourage decision makers to think creatively rather than institutionally. 2. Many parents have recently moved to the neighbourhood (root cause), but they have made the decision looking at school boundaries. For example, when we moved across the country for work, we selected the neighbourhood with Alex Ferguson in mind. We made a very expensive decision believing we had chosen the right school for our kids.
- Suggestion: A lot more information re context is required... though it may be clear to the writers of this survey what "cleary defined boundaries" are it is not clear to me.
- While I think that setting defined areas versus optional areas may be of benefit - I feel that it is extremely important to have this affect new students starting in Kindergarten/Gr. 1 only and not to disrupt the important school/community for existing students. I have 3 children who have attended AFS. We have developed relationships with the teachers and staff, and forged life long friendships with other families in the AFS community. It would

be so disorienting to have to uproot this way of life for the last few years of our elementary schooling. Also - we live a few blocks down from the school and yet we are in the optional area. It seems ludicrous that we would have to switch to a school that is driving distance away. Lastly, the non optional catchment for AFS is has huge areas on non residential area and is not sustainable for providing the population base and diversity that it key to this school's success.

- Establishing boundaries must consider and adopt a policy of "grandfathering" students that now find themselves outside the boundary, allowing them to attend the school they have attended for at least two years. Our house is geographically in between of two school choices. We should be able to choose which one is easier and safer to access, and best for our child.
- It is very important to us that our children are able to continue at this school until the end of Grade 6.

- The boundaries should be set to the closest school. We are in the optional area to AF and kids walk there, if they were sent somewhere else we would lose that option as AF is the closest school to us.
- address the clear difference in quality between schools in the area forcing parents to choose a school with failing grades is not a good solution even if it does take the pressure off surrounding schools
- First, I don't understand how this option boundary review relates to the new schools that are opening. The new schools appear to be all west of Sarcee Trail whereas the option boundary is a small area considerably east of the new schools. Secondly, I live in the option area, and I am very concerned about the impact this could have on my family. Both students and parents are deeply invested in Alexander Ferguson, which is also the closest school to our house. We are concerned, without seeing proposed zones and therefore only rumours to go on, that we will be put outside of the zone and be forced to leave Alexander Ferguson. Our child has forged strong relationships with students and teachers that would be torn apart by a forced move. It would be both heartbreaking and stressful and detrimental to their social development which is a key learning goal of early education. Furthermore as parents we have also forged strong relationships with staff and parents at the school. We invested time and effort volunteering with the



school and building a community amongst parents and staff that would be dismantled and laid waste should our child be forced to move. Finally, even if my child was allowed to remain, I am concerned about the prospects of their younger sibling's ability to attend Alexander Ferguson which, is important to because it provides continuity, strengthens our ties and community involvement with the school and improves socialization. I hope that any actions that are taken will not cause undue hardship to the students and families living within the option boundary. Thank you.

- Our child attended Alex Ferguson, and it was by far the best school available to us. Don't take this option away from families.

- I would like to see minimal disruption for students and ensure students can still attend the closest school to their home.
- This is a terrible survey. Why not have us rank them instead? Also, many of the principles are unclear and need more clarification.
